- 2. I didn't hear the news until the next day. (more formal) It was not until the next day that I heard the news.
- 3. I felt that it had been a mistake to write the letter. (more formal) I regretted ever having written the letter.
- 4. Although it rained torrentially, we all enjoyed the excursion. (more formal) Despite the torrential rain, the excursion was enjoyed by all.
- 5. The Manager is not to be disturbed. (more formal) On no account is the manager to be disturbed,
- 6. If we don't hear from you within seven days, the order will be cancelled. (less formal) Unless we hear from you within seven days, we will fulfil the order.
- 7. If you didn't contribute generously, we couldn't continue our work. (more formal) But for your generous contribution, the work could not have been continued.
- 8. There's a chance that my secretary took the order book away. (similar) My secretary may have taken the order book away.
- 9. This dispute is likely to lead to a strike. (similar)This dispute may well result in a strike.
